This week's learning ...

Reception classes ... This week we learnt about Bristol Castle for local history week. We found out why it was built, who built it, who destroyed and lots of other information about it. We also learnt about the different parts of a castle. You can support your child's learning by going to see Bristol Castle in Castle park. Encourage your child to tell you the story of Bristol Castle.

Year 1 ... In Literacy this week we learnt about nouns and verbs. We used our grammar goggles to find them in sentences. In Maths we made different amounts of money with different coins! We also investigated the life of John Cabot, and why he is important to Bristol. Please show your child different coins at home and talk about their values. Please read every night, and ask children to talk about the books they have read.

Year 2... This week we learnt to make amounts of money using different coins. In Literacy, we designed safety posters and wrote a diary entry about a train journey. We enjoyed learning about the Great Western railway as well! **At home, please show your child different coins and talk about their different values.**

Year 3 ... This week we learnt about money and created amounts of money in different ways. In literacy, we wrote about 'How to make chocolate' as we have been learning about Bristol's chocolate past for local history week. We discovered how chocolate arrived in Europe, what chocolate houses were and what life was like in Fry's factory. We finished the week with a trip to M Shed where we looked at chocolate making equipment and acted in role as factory workers. It was fantastic! At home, encourage your child to work out how much money is needed to pay for your shopping and the change they will need back.

Year 4 ... This week we learnt about George Muller and the orphanages he set up in Bristol during the Victorian times. We asked historical questions, researched the daily lives of Victorian children, and created wonderful dramas about the orphans. In Numeracy we completed money challenges as part of our Measurement topic. **Please help at home by asking questions about George Muller and practising counting change at the shops**.

Year 5... This week we learnt about the changes in St Philips since the Industrial Revolution. We thought about the lives of factory workers during Victorian times and produced plays to show what the lives of factory workers were like. We enjoyed a walk around the local area finding out about the history of different buildings. **Please discuss with your child how the local area has changed since the Industrial Revolution.**

Year 6 ... This week we learnt about the Bristol Blitz and World War 2. We thought about the lives of children during this time and wrote letters in the role of a child about to be evacuated to the countryside. We enjoyed a walk around the local area finding out about ruins and remains during the Blitz. **You can help at home by supporting your child to research historical information about evacuation during the Bristol Blitz.**
