

## What have we been learning?

Reception.... We started to learn the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' this week. We also enjoyed a very exciting visit from an author and many children worked on being authors and illustrators of their own stories. As mathematicians we practised measuring time, length, height and weight. At home please support your child to use words like longer, shorter, heavier, lighter to compare things. Use a timer or stop watch to measure how long it takes you to do an activity.

Year 2...We had a visit from the author Nicola Colton and we enjoyed listening to her read and watching her draw the characters Jasper and Scruff from her book! We also had a trip to Andalusia Academy where we met and played with the children and learnt how their school was different to Hannah More. At home, please continue to read with your child every day. Encourage them to practise their times tables.

Year 4... Some of the children have excitedly headed off to Barton Camp this week! Those that have stayed at school have taken part in some plastic art with Miss Burnett! Do check Twitter for lots of photos of the children's camp adventure! Year 1... This week we learned about preposition language, and applied it to our story; The Lonely Beast. We also continued our learning about weight. Gruffalo class were very lucky and went on a school trip to visit a local art studio, and Elmer class met an author; Nicola Coulton! A busy, busy week! At home, read with your child every night. Compare how much things weigh, talk to them about where objects are; e.g. on the, in the, above the etc.

Year 3... We set sail on the Matthew this week, to understand more about John Cabot and his voyage. As writers, we started a new book and began thinking about the characters within this. As Mathematicians we collected data to put in our own pictograms. At home, please read with your child and ask them questions about the book they are reading. Also encourage your child to practise their times tables.

Year 5... This week Year 5 have developed their skills of 'show not tell'. They have described personalities and feelings and have used the technique to write a more interesting and engaging 'next chapter'. In maths we revised our knowledge of angles and learned how to use a protractor to measure. In Enquiry we enjoyed researching life cycles of different living things such as humans, animals and plants. At home, can you support your child to describe members of their family using the 'show not tell' technique?

Year 6... This week we explored probability further as mathematicians, wrote a narrative from our class book 'The Arrival' as authors and tested out hypotheses as scientists! We also showed improvements in our swimming skills this week and started to talk about our end-of-term Year 6 performance! Kestrel were finally able to go to IntoUniversity this week to think about Year 7. At home, please ensure your children complete their homework to a high standard - in readiness for secondary school.
