

International Migrants Day

What Is International Migrants Day?

International Migrants Day began in 1990. The International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families was created at this time and it is the job of the United Nations to make sure that all migrants and their families are looked after properly.

What Is a Migrant?

A migrant is someone who has chosen to leave their own country. They may get a new job in another country. A migrant may take their family with them to their new country. They will pack all of the items that they need and spend time saying goodbye to friends and family before leaving.



Refugees

There are some people who need to leave their country because it is such an unsafe place to be. This might be because of war or because their homes have been destroyed by natural disasters, such as hurricanes or tsunamis. People who need to leave their homes, not through choice but because of necessity, are called refugees.

Reasons for Migration

Some people may move for a new job, or to study at school, college or university. Some families may move because they have relatives already in a new country and want to be closer to them. In 2015, 244 million people were recorded as migrants by the United Nations. Most of these people moved to either Europe or Asia.

Did You Know?

Half of the people who migrate to a new country move to get a job.

International Migrants Day

What Is International Migrants Day?

International Migrants Day is held on the 18th December. In 1990, the United Nations created the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families to educate people about the benefits of migration and to ensure that the rights of all migrants are being met.

What Is a Migrant?

A migrant is someone who has left their own country to seek a better life in another country. Some people leave their country voluntarily, often because the work opportunities in another country may be better. They will spend time choosing the required belongings they need to take with them, whilst saying goodbye to friends and family whom they are leaving behind.

What about Those Who Do Not Choose to Leave?

On the other hand, there are some people who are forced to leave their country because it is such a dangerous place to be. Sadly, many countries are experiencing war. For some families, it is safer to leave their country.

Natural disasters such as earthquakes, hurricanes and tsunamis can damage or destroy homes and this leaves people with no choice but to depart. In 2015, 244 million people were recorded as migrants by the United Nations. Most of these people migrated to either Europe or Asia.

Did You Know?

The most common country of origin for migrants entering the UK is India.



Why Choose the UK?

In 2016, around half of the migrants who came to the UK arrived for work reasons. There are some excellent work opportunities in Britain, and this is why some families choose to move here.

With English being a language spoken by many people around the world, some people already have sufficient knowledge of the language to acquire work in the UK, even if English is not their first language.

The UK is perceived as being supportive of human rights and accepting of all religious beliefs, which is also a positive factor for migrants. They may already have family members in the UK who have previously relocated. This reduces some of the stress in finding a home and a network of support around them.

Did You Know?

Just under one fifth of migrants move to Britain for family reasons. There is also a demand for workers with a variety of skills, meaning that there are plenty of opportunities for many people.

What Is International Migrants Day?

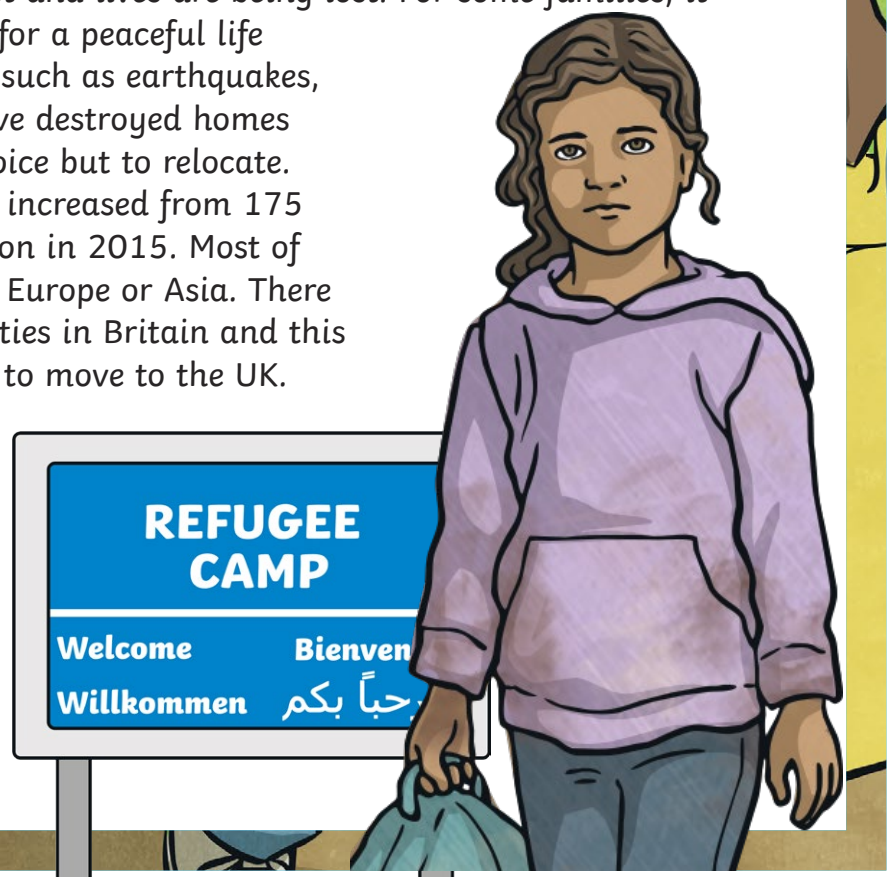
International Migrants Day is held on the 18th December. In 1990, the United Nations created the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families to highlight the positive benefits of migration to both migrants and migrant countries. The United Nations works hard to ensure that migrants are not being exploited. They created the convention to try to achieve this aim. It is a requirement to ensure that the rights of all migrants and their families are being met.

What Is a Migrant?

A migrant is someone who has left their own country to seek a better life in another country for a variety of reasons. Some people voluntarily leave their country. They decide to move and spend the necessary time choosing the essential belongings to take with them, whilst saying goodbye to friends and family whom they are leaving behind. This move can be exciting and financially and educationally positive, but may also be daunting for the families.

What about Those Who Do Not Choose to Leave?

On the other hand, there are some people who are forced to leave their country because it is such a perilous place to be. Sadly, many countries are experiencing war and conflict and lives are being lost. For some families, it is safer to flee their country for a peaceful life elsewhere. Natural disasters such as earthquakes, hurricanes and tsunamis have destroyed homes and leave people with no choice but to relocate. The number of migrants has increased from 175 million in 2000 to 244 million in 2015. Most of these people moved to either Europe or Asia. There are excellent work opportunities in Britain and this is why some families choose to move to the UK.



Why Choose the UK?

In 2016, around half of the migrants who came to the UK came for work reasons. There are some excellent work opportunities in Britain, and this is why some families choose to move here.

With English being a language spoken by many people around the world, some people already have sufficient knowledge of the language to acquire work in the UK, even if English is not their first language. The UK is perceived as being supportive of human rights and accepting of all religious beliefs, which is also a positive factor for migrants. There is demand for workers with a variety of skills, meaning that in high-skilled and low-skilled work meaning that there are plenty of opportunities for many people.

Just under one fifth of migrants move to Britain for family reasons. They may already have family members in the UK who have previously relocated. This reduces some of the stress in finding a home and a network of support around them.

The most common country of origin for migrants entering the UK is India.



Where Else Do People Migrate From?

Other common countries that people move from include Pakistan, Poland, Australia and China.
